
Robin Parker Executive Director

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
Special Workshop Series



During this fall and winter, we are offering four workshops that will focus on frames of oppression in the areas of race, gender, sexual orientation/gender identity, and ability. Traditional social science views the problems of racism, sexism and other forms of oppression as mostly a matter of prejudice or stereotyping. Although useful, that approach does not capture the deeplyembedded structure of oppression.

In the workshops we will explore how the four forms of oppression are not simply historical legacies of bigotry, but foundational frames: that is, societal structure expressed through narratives, images, language, and ideology. We will also explore counter-frames that heal oppression and offer hope to persons from marginalized groups.

The White Racial Frame:

A New View of Racism

The white racial frame is a centuries-old worldview that constantly involves a racial construction of societal reality in America. It rationalizes racial interaction, inequities and racial patterns, operates institutionally and interpersonally, and is taught in home, school, business and the media.

In the workshop we'll explore how the white racial frame is a systemic part of our society. We'll also look at the counter-frames people of color and their allies have used to undo racism.

The Androcentric Frame: A New View of Sexism

Androcentrism is the practice of placing male human beings or the male point of view at the center of culture and history. Even today, literature, television and film, the arts, politics, sports, and other cultural markers are driven by an androcentric frame that values men and devalues women.

Yet other frames, including the feminist frame, provide powerful ways of addressing sexism and promise to transform and enrich our society. Join us for this unique learning opportunity.

The Hetero/Cisgender Frame: A New View of LGBTQ Oppression

Today being heterosexual and cisgender (not transgender) is considered mainstream. But a vast history of LGBTQ people in western and global societies is often forgotten or minimized. A hetero/cisgender frame has pathologized LGBTQ people, pushed them to societal margins, and often called into question their very right to live.

We'll explore how sexual beliefs, homophobic images and language, and the perception of heterosexual and cisgender people as superior have played a systemic role in LGBTQ oppression. Join us to learn about counter-frames that promise to make our society more open and inclusive for LGBTQ people and their allies.

The Ableist Frame:

A New View of Ahleism



People with disabilities have been seen as objects of pity and charity, or people who need to be "fixed" through medical or other intervention. Historically they have been viewed as possessed by evil spirits and subject to institutionalization, sterilization, and even euthanasia.

A more recent frame, the disability rights frame, is moving people with disabilities beyond the stereotypes of meager, tragic individuals to people who are defined according to their full humanity. This workshop will be especially useful to participants who want to explore and undo deeply-embedded often invisible biases that harm people with disabilities.

Summer Institute

Race has been called the great American obsession and has shaped the lives of people in our country for hundreds of years. Even today race strongly influences life expectancy, quality of healthcare, income, wealth, job opportunities, incarceration rates, quality of education, and much more. Race also affects the way we relate to one another, and the things we say and don't say about this difficult topic. This institute is a way to understand and change the damage race does in our society.

You are invited to a setting in which participants from diverse backgrounds explore race in new ways and build community across racial differences. The workshop will be interactive and highly participatory. Learning activities will include a trip to Philadelphia's Constitution Center, African American Museum, and Chinatown.

In this institute you will learn:

- Why early messages about race shape individual perceptions.
- The effects of whiteness and white racial privilege on the culture of the United States.
- How power influences group behavior in the United States.
- The history of race in the United States and how that history has shaped attitudes and behaviors.
- How ideology about race influences individual and institutional behavior.
- Why internalized racial superiority and internalized racial oppression hinder the ability to address racism.
- Action planning to address race and racism in the places where participants live and work.

The institute is open to learners of all cultural backgrounds. We especially welcome the voices of those not usually heard in anti-racism training, including LGBTQI people, white men, Asians, bi-racial and multi-racial people, and indigenous people.

This course is open to everyone; however, it is eligible for three credits toward a Graduate Certificate in Diversity from the University of Colorado Colorado Springs.
